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Who is required to go into isolation?

The goal of isolation is to reduce infection and contain the spread of COVID-19 in Israel. Isolation means avoiding contact with other people, including household members for the period specified in the Ministry of Health Director General Order.

People who have had close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case (whether they are aware of it, or have received a notification from contact tracing) at the time that the confirmed patient might have been contagious, must go into isolation.


Close contact is defined as follows:

- A distance of less than 2 meters from a confirmed COVID-19 case for at least 15 minutes
- If the identity of the confirmed COVID-19 case is unknown and suspicion of contact is raised on the basis of just sharing a space - one had to be in that space for at least 15 minutes
- Working next to a confirmed COVID-19 case or staying with a confirmed COVID-19 case in the same classroom
- **Traveling** with a confirmed COVID-19 case by any means of transport
- Household members living with a confirmed COVID-19 case.
- Physical contact, such as kissing, hugging, or shaking hands with a confirmed COVID-19 case, regardless of length of shared time spent

It is important to know that a confirmed COVID-19 case may seem healthy and without any symptoms, but nonetheless might be contagious.

There is no need for an explicit instruction from the Ministry of Health. A person must go into isolation if they know they have had close contact with a confirmed COVID-19 patient:

- Household members (people who live together in the same place) are close contacts of each other, so if one household member receives a positive test result, all household members must isolate immediately, even before contact tracing or receiving instructions from a doctor. People who have been completely isolated from other household members and have not had close or daily contact with them are exempt of isolation (for example - a soldier in secured base who has not been home during the contagious duration) – only in this case, there is no need to go into isolation.
- People who are not household members
 - Contact with a **symptomatic** confirmed COVID-19 case:
 - If you know when symptoms started: if close contact occurs within 4 days before symptoms displayed.
 - If you do not know when symptoms started: if close contact occurs within 7 days before receiving the positive test result.
 - Contact with an asymptomatic confirmed COVID-19 case close contact within 7 days before receiving a positive test result.

If you receive a text message (SMS) or voice mail from the Ministry of Health, you are required to go into isolation upon receiving such a message, even if none of the close contact clauses above applies to you. You can authenticate the text (SMS) or voice mail by calling 08-6822334 to verify the Ministry of Health sent it to you.

Duration of isolation

People who have had contact with a confirmed case are required to complete 13 full days in isolation + the hours remaining until 24:00 on the 14th day after the time of the last contact with the confirmed case. Information about the option to shorten the duration of isolation

Onset of symptoms

If you have symptoms related to COVID-19 within 14 days following contact with a confirmed COVID-19 case, even if both of you had protection, and even if both of you were not required to isolate or you have already completed a shorter isolation duration or for any other reason, you must go into isolation and get tested for COVID-19.

There is no need to go to the HMO clinic or the emergency room at the hospital, unless it is a medical emergency. In case of an emergency, call your HMO clinic or the hospital ahead and mention that a potential COVID-19 case is about to arrive.

Reporting

People in isolation are required to report their isolation address to the Ministry of Health. Parents are required to report each child who is in isolation.
